As we near the end of the month of February, we reflect on a month of celebration for the lives and work of African Americans throughout history. Coatesville Area School District's mission is clear - Rich in Diversity. Committed to Excellence. Our Board of School Directors and the CASD administrative team is committed to promoting equity and inclusion in every one of our schools and buildings. We know that sharing the rich cultural diversity within our communities makes us stronger as we seek to address and eliminate perceptions and bias and aid our understanding of each other.

The history of our community is one that was formed and shaped because of our diversity and this month is a special time to reflect, engage, and to educate ourselves on the people and innovators that have contributed to building our great nation. W.C. Atkinson M.D. is an example of an innovator and leader for social justice in the Coatesville community who in 1936, after being rejected to join the staff of Coatesville Hospital, built a five-bed hospital next to his home, which grew to 60 beds. He served as medical director and chair of the board of directors. He was interested in creating a place African Americans could go and be treated as human beings and with dignity. In addition, W.C. Atkinson M.D. distinguished himself as the First African American physician in the city of Coatesville in 1927, a co-founder of the NAACP Coatesville Branch, was the First African American president of the Chester County Medical Society and was recognized as General Practitioner of the Year for the PA Medical Association. The resilience, excellence, and strength of our neighbors is a story of perseverance and courage.

Throughout this month, classrooms across the district have engaged in activities to recognize and honor the triumphs and struggles of African Americans who helped make this country great. Activities ranged from school-wide announcements, to writing pieces, to research projects, to dance parties featuring African American musical artists.











Celebrating Black History Month

Rainbow Elementary School is proud to join our nation in honoring Black History Month. The celebratory month, also known as National African American History Month, is an annual celebration of achievements by African Americans and a time for recognizing the central role of African Americans in the story of the United States of America.










Periodic Table of Black History

Caln Students Focus on Impactful Individuals

Caln students continue to learn about influential Leaders and Individuals during Black History Month!

Caln students have been continuing to engage in activities and lessons to learn about influential figures in Black History. Each day, students are learning about a new individual and their impact on the nation or the world, during the announcements. Throughout the month of February, there have been articles, book links, and highlights about influential figures, that parents could review with their students. All Caln teachers have had specific activities and lessons that they have engaged in throughout the month, such as:

- Interactive read-alouds to learn about a variety of African Americans who contributed to the Civil Rights Movement
- Learning pairs to compare and contrast leaders' objectives, actions, and successes
- Reading about important leaders in Black history and writing summaries of each influential figure they read about
- Researching influential African American people and creating informational booklets
- Researching influential leaders and inventors that changed our world and presenting to the class
- Learning about Influential Musicians such as Jimi Hendrix and B.B. King and will compose their own 12 bar blues




First Grade Science Cycles

As part of the Open Court program, Mrs. Norton's first graders just finished their reading unit theme on Science Cycles. They read and learned about the life cycles of water, insects, and flowers. The class observed the plant cycle by planting seeds and watching the roots develop, the sprout come through the soil and now they have the plant. The students are eagerly waiting for the flower!







Algebra Applications

Mrs. Pearson's and Mrs. Barlip's Algebra students learned about Tagging Fish as they used proportional thinking to estimate the population of fish in a lake. Fish biologists need to keep track of fish populations in the waters they monitor. This number fluctuates throughout the year, however, as fish move in and out of the lake. Therefore, biologists need a way to gather current data quickly and inexpensively.

The class objective was for students to apply their proportional understanding to solve an application problem. The class "lake" was a giant container with "fish" (Goldfish crackers). Their task was to determine the number of fish in their lake as accurately as possible without counting the fish. The class conducted a lab where they pulled out a net full of fish, tagged them (replacing them with pretzel fish), and then returned them to the "lake". The class did a few catches and collected data on how many tagged fish verses total fish were caught in each net. They used proportional reasoning to estimate the total fish in their lake!







Fifth Grade Girls Visit Fluxspace



This week, fifth grade girls were invited to Fluxspace to engage in a day of innovative thinking and problem solving. Teams were provided with a small bowl of materials and were told to construct the highest tower possible that could support a ping pong ball. The students were able to work collaboratively to solve any issues that arose during the design process. Once the towers were complete, the students needed to deconstruct and reuse the same materials to create a catapult that would send their ping pong ball the farthest. Each team brought unique ideas to the table and found various solutions to the common problem. Caln Elementary teacher, Ms. Rainer remarked, "What a great opportunity for our girls. They can't stop talking about it! You should have seen all of their creative minds at work!"

Following lunch, students were encouraged to explore the different areas and labs set up within Fluxspace. They took a virtual rollercoaster ride in the immersive Igloo experience, visited the STEM lab, and got to observe a robotic dog and drone security system being tested in the parking lot.



Recognizing Influential Figures

For Black History Month, ninth grader students in Mr. Raibley and Mrs. Holley-Sheppard's English classes researched influential African Americans and created posters about the individual's life accompanied by a paragraph about why they admired them.



Robotics Club Goes to State Finals

School Board Updates

The Coatesville Area School Board met on Wednesday, February 23, 2022. The full meeting agenda can be found here and you can watch the recording here.

The first presentation of the night came from Rainbow Elementary. The Rainbow Reps are a group of students who were chosen via an application and screening process to serve on the school's Student Council. You can watch that presentation here.
