

March on Kings Highway

Yesterday, the students and staff at Kings Highway Elementary assembled for a reencatment of Dr. Martin Luther King's March on Washington. As students gathered at the start of the march, the whole school sang *We Shall Overcome*, which was a key anthem of the American Civil Rights movement.





In the weeks leading up to this event, each class learned about the civil rights movement and the March on Washington. Following these lessons, students made signs to carry in their own march to express their desires for equal rights, love, and justice for all.

Led by students portraying Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Coretta Scott King, everyone participated in the march while reciting words in unison – Justice, Equality, Freedom, Love, and Peace.





The march concluded in the auditorium where fifth grade students performed a rendition of *Lift Every Voice* under the direction of music teacher, Ms. Poyer. Chaeli Alston, portraying Coretta Scott King, then introduced Lamar Murray, portraying Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Lamar delivered the *I Have a Dream* speech and astounded the room with his passionate delivery of this historical moment.





CASD Students Visit Lincoln University



School Board Member Dr. Harvel Brown arranged for Coatesville students to attend a presentation by Dr. Julius Garvey, the son of the United Negro Improvement Association and publisher of the Negro World weekly newspaper. Dr. Garvey talked to students from Coatesville and Lincoln University about the life and legacy of his father. He encouraged them to be conscious of their actions, bring positive energy to everything they do, and to constantly seek knowledge and wisdom. While at Lincoln, students went on a brief

tour of the campus and ate lunch with Lincoln students who discussed the benefits of an HBCU (historically black college and university) education and their transition experiences from high school to college. We are grateful to the University for providing more information to our students to help them make important decisions regarding their post-secondary goals.

CAIHS Celebrates Black History Month

The students at the Intermediate High School celebrated Black History Month this morning with a look at important figures throughout history as well as various performances. Assistant Principal Dr. Alston led this presentation, which was comprised entirely of Coatesville students, staff, and community members. AP Language and Composition Class Reflects on Letter from Birmingham Jail

Advanced Placement students in Mr. Jordan and Mrs. Groff's English class took a closer look at *Letter from Birmingham Jail (1963)*, by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The class discussed Dr. King's purpose and tone throughout the letter and analyzed the rhetoric he utilized to convey his position. Mr. Jordan stated that, "this letter is an exceptional piece to analyze the structure and delineation of an argument."

Three student analyses were selected by peer vote for their remarkable examination of this important historical document.



In his 1963 *Letter from Birmingham Jail*, the well-known civil rights leader and minister, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. refutes the claim that he is an "outside agitator" and that his protest in Birmingham was "...unwise and untimely..."(2). King supports his argument through the use of various rhetorical appeals, personal anecdotes, repeated use of metaphor, and antithesis, as well as both historical and biblical references. King aims to convince the clergymen in Birmingham to view his protest as a necessary means to the just end of desegregation in order to gain their support of his movement for equality. Ultimately, King's tone is not only calm but also assertive, and he is respectful towards the clergymen who have imprisoned him. King willingly assumes that they had good intentions despite their criticism towards him. – *Sam Campos*

When first introduced in *Letter from Birmingham Jail*, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. responded negatively to being labeled an "extremist". This is evident when King asserts that he was "...rather disappointed that fellow clergymen would see [his] nonviolent efforts as those of an extremist" (27). However, King eventually grew to accept and embrace the label of "extremist" and used biblical allusions to act as justification: "Was not Jesus an extremist for love...Was not Amos an extremist for justice...Was not Paul an extremist for the Christian gospel" (30). Then, King continues to ask the following questions: "Will we be extremists for hate or for love? Will we be extremists for the preservation of justice or for the extension of justice" (30). His repeated use of the word "extremist" contributes to the sincere, rational, and honest tone of the letter because King assigns the word a positive connotation. Instead of allowing the label to affect him negatively and diminish his cause, King draws power upon it, and he utilizes the label to reinforce his fight for equality.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., advances his purpose throughout his *Letter from Birmingham Jail* by employing metaphor and personal anecdote in order to refute the criticism that his protest in Birmingham was "unwise and untimely" (2). King describes that some critics tell him to "Wait!" to take direct action against the forces of segregation. In response, he juxtaposes the speed of political and social progress in the United States with other areas of the world. He employs metaphor, explaining that "The nations of Asia and Africa are moving with jet like speed toward gaining political independence, but [African Americans] still creep at horse and buggy pace toward gaining a cup of coffee at a lunch counter" (15). King frequently uses metaphor in his rhetoric, as it creates clear imagery of the issue for the audience. The metaphor develops King's argument that his protest in Birmingham was timely by revealing that the United States is moving at a sluggish pace at achieving

equality compared to the rapid political progress of other countries. Additionally, a personal anecdote of his experiences with racial segregation advances his purpose by evoking pathos and establishing his ethos. Further refuting his audience's claim that his protest was hastily made, King recalls when he had to explain to his six-year-old daughter "...why she can't go to the public amusement park that has just been advertised on television, and see tears welling up in her eyes when she is told that Funtown is closed to colored children..." (15). Vividly describing his daughter's tears and disappointment is an emotional appeal which, ideally, garners compassion from the audience. Moreover, this anecdote establishes King's ethos as someone who has experienced racial discrimination. His rhetorical appeals underscore the urgency to take direct action against segregation and censure the argument of the clergyman that his protest was ill-timed. *-Andrew Kline*
