## **Pi Day Celebrations**

## Students Complete 2023 Science Buddies Engineering Challenge

Students in Mr. Nelson's Computer Aided Design class engaged in the engineering design process by participating in the 2023 Science Buddies Engineering Challenge. This is an international challenge that encourages students to use their problem-solving skills to design, build, and test contraptions. Students worked through the engineering design process in groups to brainstorm, plan, and the draw the devices in AutoCAD. Once the group agreed on a design, they manufactured the device out of paper, string, tape, and paper clips to pick up a ping pong ball and return it to a start line. The object was to pick up a ball from the furthest distance using the least number of materials. Many groups created devices that worked over 150cm, with the winning device coming in at 212cm.
