


Cadets enjoying the "Turkey Hill Experience"

PA-771 Takes Flight..... Simulated, That Is

On August 7th, cadets from PA-771 departed the high school at 7am and drove over to McGuire AFB, NJ to tour the KC-10 Flight and Air Refueling Simulators. The hour and a half ride to the base would turn out to be a small inconvenience for the experiences we would have during the day.

When we arrived at the simulator building we were greeted by Eric Thomas, a retired Boom Operator who served with MSgt Sidoli in the 32nd Air Refueling Squadron. He took us to the "boom operator" simulator where we took turns performing air refueling on a variety of Air Force aircraft from fighters to cargo planes. After the "boom" simulator, retired KC-10 pilot, Scott Roe brought us all to the KC-10 simulator where we were able to takeoff, fly and land the KC-10. Landing proved to be very difficult and we all have a new found appreciation for the skills necessary to fly an airplane.

After the simulators, SSgt Gordon and TSgt White had the barbeque ready for us to eat hamburgers prior to taking us out to the flightline for a tour of the KC-10. TSgt White gave us a tour of the back of the airplane which included passenger seats, the cargo compartment, and of course the air refueling compartment. Two pilots from the training squadron were on hand to discuss the capabilities of the airplane and give us a tour of the cockpit and the exterior of the airplane. In all, a great way to start our "Science of Flight" curriculum this year.
