#### Welcome to February Reeceville families!

With all of the brisk temperatures outside, there is nothing better than snuggling under a warm blanket and spending time with your child reading a book. What better way to build their reading skills and help them learn to love books? Here are three suggestions when doing so to better assist your child:

• **Read regularly-** Try to read to your child every day. You might want to aim for 10-15 minutes at bedtime for a peaceful end to the day.

• **Take turns choosing books-** Your child may want to hear old favorites again. Use your turn to create a variety of new titles.

• Let them participate- Ask your child to turn the pages as you read. Also, he or she can fill in words or finish sentences that rhyme. Go slowly so he/she has time to understand and enjoy the illustrations.

• **Be playful-** Be sure to use different voices for different characters. Maybe substitute your child's name for the main character's name and use other family members' names as well.

Remember, you don't have to be an expert reader. Your child will love it when you read aloud because it's *you.*

### **Counselor's Corner**

Now that the excitement of the holidays has past and the expectations of students have increased, in many homes the homework battle often becomes more intense. Our students are asked to sit in a classroom for many hours and then asked to complete more work when they get home. Although homework is essential for students to master the skills that are required of them, it still can cause much frustration for not only the children but their parents as well. If you find yourself in this battle, here are some suggestions to try and ease some of the stress caused by daily homework.

- Determine what time of night works best for your child. Some children do homework best as soon as they get home from school when they are still focused; however, other children need some time to decompress. Determine a set amount of time that your child can play before he/she has to begin his/her homework. If he/she knows what to expect, there is often a less chance of an argument.
- Every child has different strengths and weaknesses. Prioritize the subjects in the order of difficulty for the child and start with the most difficult subject. This will allow him/her to complete the most challenging homework before he/she gets tired.
- Some children need frequent breaks. Set a reasonable amount of time for the child to do homework and then allow for a short break. For example, a child may do 15 minutes of homework and then have a 5 minute break. *Use a timer*!! Using a timer tells your child exactly when he/she gets his/her breaks and when it is time to get back to work.
- Cover up all the problems except the one your child is working on. Some students get overwhelmed by the number of problems. If they just focus on one at a time, this often reduces some of this stress.

We are getting good at decoding, word building and identifying beginning and ending sounds in words. We have been practicing the teen numbers in Math and have been introduced to the plus sign and the equal sign. I guess you could say we are getting ready for First Grade. We are enjoying all of the Math games we have been playing too! We are looking forward to celebrating Valentine's Day and the 100th Day of School. We will be displaying all of the 100 objects in the front lobby showcases - stop in and take a peek! We hope the ground hog was right and spring is on the way!

## **First Grade News**

- First grade is looking forward to celebrating Valentine's Day together on the 12<sup>th</sup>. The children always enjoy receiving and reading cards from their friends. Reading their Valentine's Day cards is great practice and fun! Ask your child to read their cards to you at home too!
- First graders are doing well on their spelling tests every Friday. Please remember to help your child complete their spelling sentences and return their spelling folder on Friday. We encourage parents to help with the correct spelling of words while writing, and we also encourage students to add details to their sentences. We like to say....if you are 6 years old, you should use at least 6 words in each sentence. If you are 7 years old, you should use at least 7 words in your sentences<sup>©</sup>
- Based on our recent Reading Assessments 1<sup>st</sup> graders are demonstrating terrific progress. Of course **you** can never read to your child too much or have **them** read too much! Fluency (reading how we talk) is something all first graders should practice. Use a book that your child is familiar with and let them read it over and over until they can read it fluently. You can "model" for them what it should sound like and then let them try it!
- While you are riding in the car with your child, use this time to help your child learn their phone number, address, and birthdate. Knowing your address and phone number is really a safety issue; you never know when this information could help your child. Also, please make sure your child knows their last name and can spell their last name too! This skill could greatly help them as well.
- We hope 2016 is finding your family healthy and happy! We appreciate all that you do to support your child's education and Reeceville School.



We have a lot going on in 2nd grade! In Language Arts we will be reading and writing about the contributions of African-Americans throughout history. We will be reading a fascinating biography about George Washington Carver. In addition to learning about Carver's experiments, we will be doing some experimenting of our own in class as we learn about solids, liquids and gases in Science. In Everyday Math we will continue to explore a variety of topics, with a focus on solving word problems (a.k.a. "number stories"). For our Being a Writer program, we will be reading and writing non-fiction. One final note: our class Valentine's parties will be on Friday, 2/12 - which also happens to be the 100th day of school!



Third grade is moving along at a fast pace. It is hard to believe that we are over 100 days into the school year. These last few weeks in third grade have found us finishing up our Social Studies unit on Landforms and starting our news Science unit on magnets. Students are enjoying finding out how magnets work and all the surprising places you can find them.

In Math, we have spent time learning about shapes and their characteristics as well as how some shapes are alike and different from other shapes. The students also learned how to figure out the area and perimeter of rectangular spaces. Students will now be investigating and exploring fractional parts and how they relate to wholes. Students are also practicing strategies to use to solve problems they may encounter on the P.S.S.A. tests.

In Reading, the students have been switching classrooms to meet with the new students and perhaps a new third grade teacher to work on reading strategies that are geared to their particular reading level. These session are 30 minutes long and are meant to focus the students on looking at reading passages and how they should use strategies to answer the questions. Even though the ground hog has predicted an early spring, the weather remains very cold! Remind your students when they come to school in the morning, they should be dressed appropriately for outdoor recess. Hats, gloves and a warm coat are necessary so they can enjoy the chance to get out in the fresh air.

This is also a good time of the year to check with your student to see what school supplies need to be replenished. Your child should always have a couple of pencils, an eraser, a box of crayons, and a glue stick in school to complete classwork.

# 5<sup>th</sup> GRADE NEWS

In honor of Black History Month, fifth graders will study the contributions of a variety of African Americans throughout the month. Students will read profiles and complete text dependent analysis activities relating to what they have read using the UNRAAVEL strategies. Class discussions will focus on the person's contributions, both past and present. Students will have the opportunity to write an opinion piece about the person or people they feel had the greatest impact on their life or the lives of all Americans. Some of the people we will be studying include Phillis Wheatley(poet), Daniel "Chappie" James (four-star general), Booker T. Washington (educator/author), George Washington Carver (scientist), Crispus Attucks (colonial Patriot), and other modern day inventors.

Students are also very excited to participate in the PECO Smart Energy Saver Program. After completing a unit on electricity, each student will receive a student guide and workbook with engagement exercises, activities, visual aids, charts and graphs and discussion topics to support ways to save electricity. While students are studying the unit plan at school, students will take a Smart Energy Saver Kit home to work on energy saving activities with their parents. The kit includes a high-efficiency showerhead, kitchen faucet aerator, CFL light bulbs, and an LED night light. Installation instructions and activities to measure energy savings are included. After the


activities are completed at home, the workbook results are sent to PECO to analyze utilization of saving strategies.
