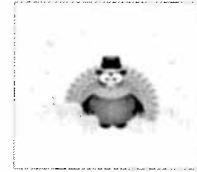

SECOND GRADE NEWS

The second grade teachers would like to thank all of the parents who came to Parent-Teacher conferences and the Father's Breakfast in November. It was great to see so many family members and we are thankful for their participation.

We continue to be very busy in 2nd grade, learning and practicing new skills. In Math, we are creating and reading different types of graphs. We are also working on reading analog clocks and calculating elapsed time. This is a skill that will help students in school, as well as in the real world. Continue to work with your child at home with telling the time or figuring out how long until a specific event..

In Language Arts, we will be comparing "the way things were" long ago, to the way things are today. The children may be asking you for some information about what you did as a child and the games you played with. We are also continuing to add details to our writing to create longer pieces of fiction.

As the normal daily temperature is colder, please be sure that your child comes to school each day prepared with the proper clothing for outside recess.

The children are getting excited about our upcoming field trip to the Dutch Apple Dinner Theater on Tuesday, December 10th. Please be sure you have sent in all the information requested.

THIRD GRADE NEWS

It seems hard to believe that the first trimester is over and we are 1/3 of the way through the school year. Visitors walking through the halls in November would have seen our classes busy working on problem solving and adding and subtracting with regrouping in Math; doing investigations involving the water cycle in Science; and learning about fact/opinion, reference sources and main idea and details in Reading. We also learned about and wrote our own *haiku*, which is a traditional form of Japanese poetry. We were busy!!

The month of December will seem even busier. While gearing up for the holidays, we will continue to develop our academic skills. We will soon be moving onto our Social Studies unit on landforms as one of our new areas of study, and in Math we will be working on skills involving addition and subtracting larger numbers, as well as working on skills for the PSSA.

We will hold our 3rd grade Spelling Bee in early December. The top three spellers from third grade will be representing us at the CASD Spelling Bee in January.

While the upcoming winter break is a long one, please don't let that time go to waste academically. Have your children continue to work on and practice their math and reading skills while at home. They can access First in Math, as well as other web sites, to practice their math skills, and daily reading should be encouraged. We look forward to our students returning to school in January ready for the remainder of their third grade school year.

FOURTH GRADE NEWS

Thank you for urging our students to read and take Accelerated Reader comprehension quizzes. Approximately 95% of the fourth grade level books in our school and community libraries are part of this great program the PTA has provided us. Our Storytown adventures continue with "Firestorms" and "The Stranger" as we continue to work on understanding what we are reading to include all the supporting details. Our robust vocabulary continues to build as words such as: reluctant, resounded, impressed, cease, and unique fill our thoughts. Don't forget about our historical fiction book reports. It has been quite challenging finding just the right book.

Our challenge in math is to perfect our math facts in order to conquer addition, subtraction, multiplication and division concepts. We are also working on time, data, graphing, and fractional measurements, geometry is just around the corner. We also have a First in Math Family Link available. In Social Studies we continue to learn about the many facets concerning our great state of Pennsylvania. We are also excited about beginning our science module on Human Body. It has been great fun exploring Earth Materials.

A highlight for 4th grade is our opportunity to be a part of the Reeceville School chorus. We have been practicing very hard and are ready for our holiday concert. We hope you can join us on December 12th to help us ring in the holidays here at Reeceville. It should be a memorable time for all.



The fifth graders will be busy these last few weeks before winter vacation. Each fifth grade class will make another visit to the VA. So far the students have enjoyed playing bingo and board games, doing crafts, and decorating seasonal bags with the veterans. On December 12th, some students will present musical selections from the winter concert for the veterans.

Here at school, we will continue to prepare for the PSSA tests by writing responses to reading prompts and using the 4 Square method to solve word problems. In Social Studies, students will be studying map skills as well as the Northeast Region of the United States. In Science, students will study electricity and complete a unit provided by PECO on electricity conservation. Students are also encouraged to take Accelerated Reader tests this month.

Finally, classroom spelling bees have begun. The fifth grade spelling bee will take place on Wednesday, December 11th.

COUNSELOR'S CORNER

Childhood friendships are more than just having a playmate. Through these friendships, children learn important social skills such as conflict resolution, teamwork, compromise, and problem solving. All these skills should be learned at an early age as they are imperative in everyday living. Some children are able to make and keep friends easily and are able to work with their peers successfully across many settings. Other children struggle with peer relationships and can not understand why they do not have friends. As a caregiver, it can be heartbreaking watching your child sit on the sideline while his/her peers are engaged in a fun activity. How do you find the words to calm your child when he/she has been left out of the neighborhood birthday party? How do you help your child learn the skills needed to make positive friendships after they have been label the playground bully?

The truth is that most children do not make it through their childhood and adolescence without enduring at least some hiccups in their social experience. As adults, it is our job to help support our children during their times of need and help them learn the social skills that will hopefully help them gain meaningful and healthy relationships.

Here are some things you may want to consider while supporting your child in their social experiences:

- Provide your child with opportunities to interact socially with children their own age. You can arrange play dates or get them involved in community events such as organized sports, scouts, or art classes.
- Remind your child that maintaining friendships is hard work. Even the best friendships may have problems every now and again. Offer to talk with your child about the problems he/she is having with his/her friends. Brainstorm ways to deal with the problem. You can role play with your child so he/she can practice what he/she is going to say.
- Discuss behaviors that help friendships and those that may hurt friendships. Discuss what qualities make a good friend and what your child can do to be a good friend to others.
- Help your child recognize those peers who may not be real friends. Some children gravitate towards peers who may encourage them to make poor or unhealthy decisions. It is important to remember that we should be respectful to everyone but some peers make better friends than others.

By supporting our children, we will hopefully be able to make our children's social experience a positive one.

News from the Nurse's Office

Top 10 Tips for Preventing the Spread of Flu

1. Keep your child home from school or day care when he or she is sick.
2. Allow your child to return to school only when fever-free for at least 24 hours (no longer having ever without use of fever-reducing medicines).
3. Cover your cough. Cough into your upper sleeve or into a tissue and discard properly.
4. Properly dispose of used tissues and other soiled items, and wash your hands after doing so.
5. Wash hands frequently and regularly, or use hand sanitizers when water is not readily available.
6. Regularly clean and disinfect areas and items likely to have frequent hand contact.
7. Contact your health care provider when your child or other family member is sick with the flu (symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, runny nose, headache and body aches).
8. If you are not able to stay home with your child, plan ahead for how he or she will be taken care of when sick at home or if school is closed.
9. Have your child vaccinated against the flu every year.
10. Stay informed through www.health.state.pa.us, www.cdc.gov, or www.flu.gov.

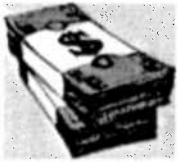
Field Trip Information

The last Friday of every month has been declared "Spirit Day" by CASD. The theme for December 20th will be pajama day!





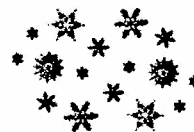
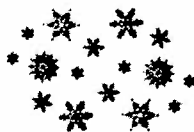

PLEASE HELP bring a smile to a child's face this holiday season!

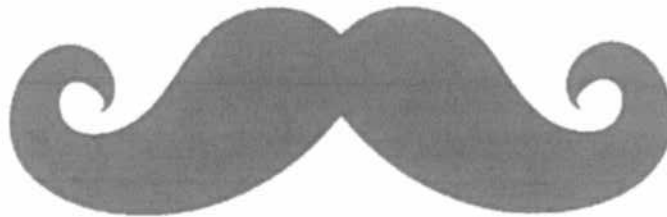

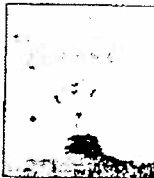

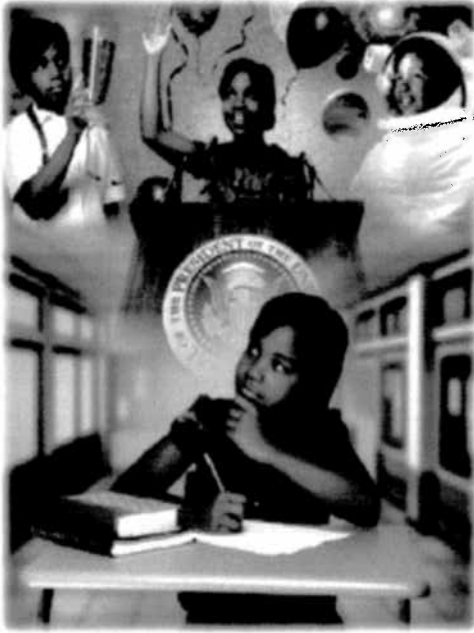
