The "21st Century Skills" movement is almost 20 years old now and over the years it became clear that the framework was too long and complicated. Out of this framework, four specific skills were determined to be the most important. They became known as the "Four Cs"— critical thinking, communication,

collaboration, and creativity. Now the challenge is to build the "Four Cs" into K-12 education, encouraging more educators to incorporate and stress the importance of the "Four Cs," and put 21st century education into classroom practice.

Making 21st Century Education Happen



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
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Critical thinking has long been a valued skill in society. Today, every student—not just the academically advanced—needs it. While critical thinking and problem solving used to be the domain of gifted students,now it's a critical domain for every student.

Critical Thinking

Critical thinking contributes to career success, but also to success in higher education and can be as or more important than content knowledge in determining success in education.

Teaching critical thinking and problem solving effectively in the classroom is vital for students. Learning critical thinking leads students to develop other skills, such as a higher level of concentration, deeper analytical abilities, and improved thought process.

Critical thinking also draws on other skills, such as communication creativity and information literacy, to examine, then analyze, interpret, and evaluate it.


While it is important to emphasize communication skills, it can be difficult to separate them from the other Cs—especially collaboration.

Why is communication important?
