Student's projects will be judged during the District Science Fair. The District's winners are eligible to compete in a countywide science fair hosted by the Chester County Intermediate Unit.

Individual schools held their own science fairs during the past few weeks. The top winners from each school were selected to participate in the District Science Fair.

'Bee Season' Welcomed at Schools

CASD students showed off their spelling skills and good sportsmanship during spelling bees held at the elementary schools and Scott Middle School.

The top spellers from each school competed in the District Spelling Bee on January 9. Joshua Koch, a fifth-grade student at King's Highway Elementary School, was the elementary school



spelling bee champ. At Scott, Jenna Hamilton emerged as the 6th grade winner after 44 rounds.

Joshua and Jenna will represent the District in the County Spelling Bee, to be held at the Chester County Intermediate Unit on February 10. East Fallowfield's spelling bee champs celebrated with a special luncheon.



Hands-On Math and Science Experiments Make Learning Fun



At the District's five elementary schools, math and science students are taking matters into their own hands, literally.

For example, at King's Highway Elementary School, math students are using different measuring tools to explore measures of distance and comparisons of mass.

In science, students have been building upon their knowledge of magnets and how they relate to electricity. Students were challenged to create a circuit that would light a lightbulb using only the materials they were given. Each group was able to reach the goal, as lightbulbs lit up all around the classroom. Students also built circuits that powered a motor.

Kindergarteners recently completed the Human Body Module. During the final challenge, they designed and made casts that would be strong, comfortable, lightweight, and water resistant.



At Reeceville Elementary School, the fifth grade just finished its second Project Lead the Way module called Robotics & Automation. Students built and investigated test beds with motors, color sensors, bumper switches, and touch LEDS. Then, they worked in groups to research and present information on different types of robots, such as industrial, consumer, medical, and military. Finally, the groups built and modified robots to solve a real-world problem: locating and removing radioactive uranium fuel from the Fukushima nuclear disaster site in Japan.

Next, fifth graders will learn to program the robots to make them autonomous to solve another real-world problem.



Make Way for the Puppet Parade!



At Reeceville Elementary School, kindergarten artists made puppets out of painted paper, basic shapes, and lines.

Students created the painted paper themselves by mixing the primary colors (like red and blue) together to make secondary colors (like purple) and then used basic shapes to build an invented animal. Students learned how to use wet glue to apply details, puff balls, feathers, shiny papers, and more to their creations.
