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## **CASD Food Distribution Continues**

The Coatesville Area School District continues to be out in the community providing Grab-and-Go Breakfast and Lunch for Coatesville kids.

CASD's Food Service Department is being assisted by a dedicated team of volunteers, including teachers, administrators, staff, Board members, and other community members. During the first full week, from March 16–20, CASD provided breakfast and lunch to 5,545 students at 12 locations. During the second week, from March 23–27, CASD provided both meals to 6,873 students.

During the week of March 30, distribution days will be held on Monday and Wednesday. The Food Service Department will also put together a set of five meals (breakfasts and lunches) to distribute on Friday, April 3 to last the entire week of Spring Break, April 6–10. If schools remain closed past April 14, meals will continue to be distributed twice weekly on Mondays and Wednesdays, from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Current locations include Coatesville Area Senior High School, Scott Middle School, Benner Building Rainbow Elementary School, Modena (at



Constructions), the West End (at Little Chef), and deliveries to Indian Run and Regency Park Apartments. Distribution dates and locations are subject to change.






